Reduce         Buy less and use less.         Purchase recycled papers.         Use softcopy instead of hard copy         Purchase environmentally friendly office supplies.         Choose to purchase items with less packaging.         Double-side printing and photocopying.         Use one-sided printed paper instead of throwing in trash.         Print and use on the one blank side of the paper         Print notices on half-sheets.         Use emails instead of faxes.         Post newsletters online.         Avoid printing out emails.         Host paper-free meetings by setting the agenda on the board.         Use fewer paper towels in the washroom or replace them with electric hand dryer.         Use refillable soap dispenser in washroom         Encourage waste-free lunches.         Reduce the use of tetra-packs by using refillable containers.
Purchase condiments, sweeteners, salt, and pepper in bulk. Use dispensers instead of individually packaged servings.
Replace disposable items with reusable items and learn to share or donateto avoid the landfill. Reuse the other side of used paper. Use reusable coffee cups and water bottles. Stock food consumption areas with reusable or biodegradable plates, cups, and cutlery.

Donate used computers, eyeglasses, cell phones, clothes, textbooks, andother items.

Divert garbage by recycling items such as paper, glass, plastics, cans, tetra packs, and cardboard.

Recycle computers and IT related waste.

Compost organic waste.

Limit contamination of recycled items by ensuring they are clean.

Recycle ink and toner products.

Ensure correct disposal methods are used for chemicals.
